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# OUR BELIEFS AND VALUES

## **Love & Grace**

# HISTORY

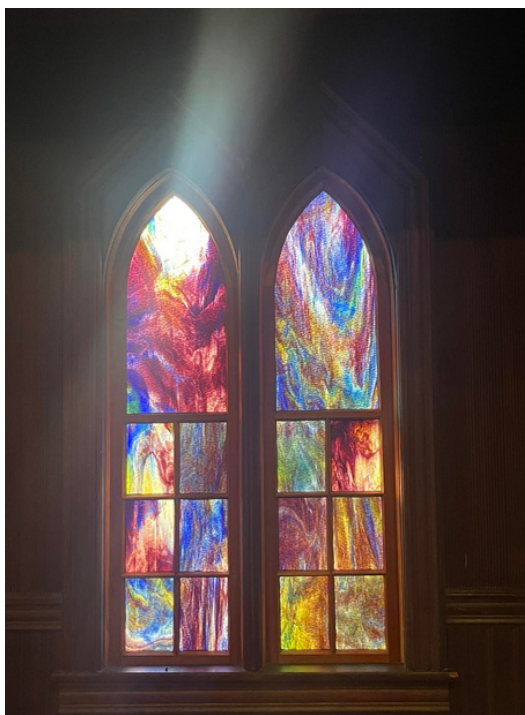
## A short history of St. Anne's Episcopal Church



After his 1892 consecration as the third bishop of Georgia, the Rt. Rev. Cleland Kinloch Nelson began the task of locating and organizing isolated Episcopalians in south Georgia. During this process, he found a handful of communicants in Tift County who wished to establish a mission for the Episcopal Church in Tifton. In 1898 the congregation known as St. Anne's was born, and the bishop sent the Rev. J.W. Turner to conduct monthly services in space borrowed at the nearby Methodist church on Love Avenue.

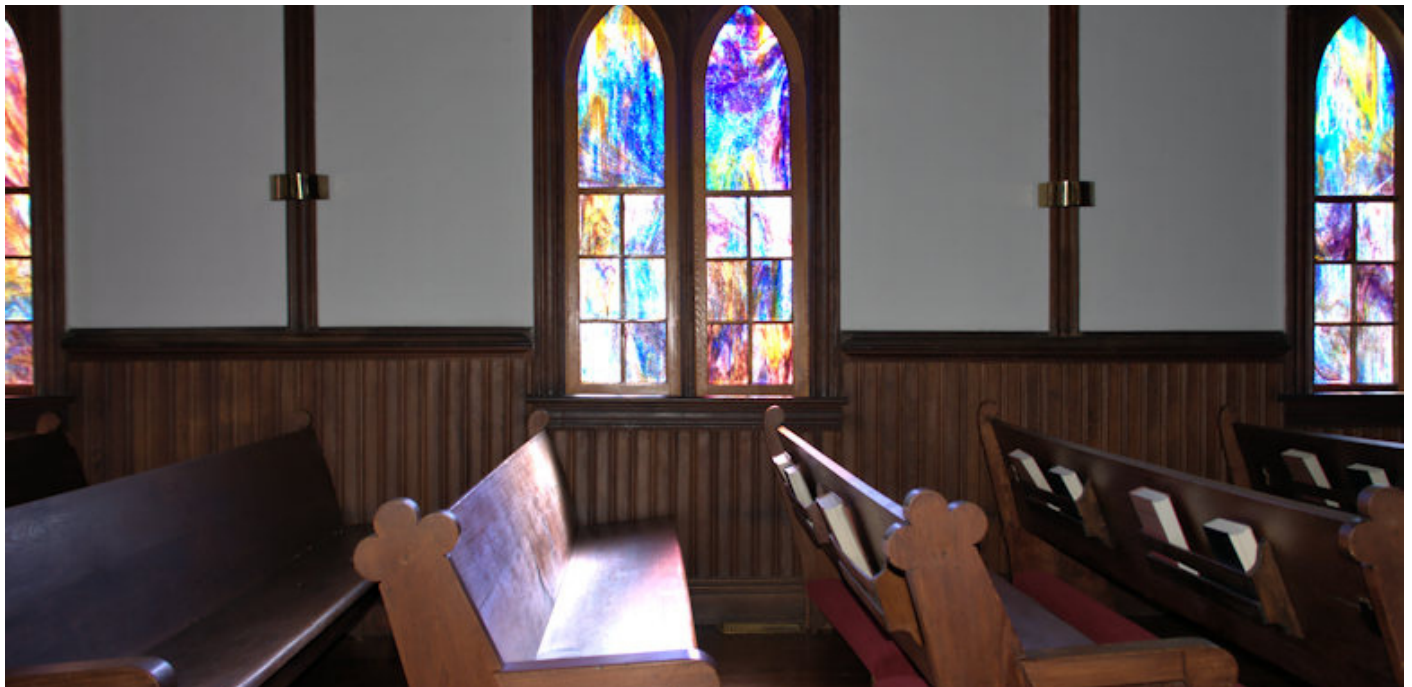


In a letter dated February 7, 1898, Bishop Nelson gave his approval to a building plan and pledged \$300 toward the total cost of \$500 for the project. Construction began on March 29, 1898, under the supervision of Edmund Harding Tift, brother of Tifton's founder Captain Henry Harding Tift. Highly successful in the lumber and shipbuilding industries, the Tifts provided for and oversaw the woodwork in the original church. Constructed from rare curly pine so delicate it had to be carved underwater, the stately carpenter gothic sanctuary became a stunning addition to the downtown Tifton landscape. After its completion, the church was consecrated by Bishop Nelson on June 1, 1902.



From 1898 to 1938, St. Anne's grew from 3 to 39 communicants and was served by fourteen different visiting priests. In 1940 while the Rev. John R. Bentley served as vicar, a combination parish hall/rectory was constructed on the property. This building allowed members to gather for social events, meals, and more while also providing living space for a resident vicar.





By 1955 St. Anne's had become fully self-supporting, thereby attaining parish status in the Diocese of Georgia. The Rev. Charles C. Demere served as the first rector from 1955 to 1959. During the 1970's St. Anne's reverted back to mission status but was later revitalized under the guidance of the Rev. Arnold A. Bush, Jr. Serving as vicar and later rector from 1974 to 1983, Fr. Bush encouraged the members of St. Anne's in growth and evangelism, ultimately resulting in the need for significant expansion.

In 1982, the same year the Rev. H Jacoba Hurst was called as rector, the small seventy-nine-year-old church was loaded on a truck and moved ten blocks north from its historic location to the church's current property at Central Ave. and 24th St. In 1983 an education building was constructed on the property, allowing room for offices and Sunday School classes.

With three Sunday services conducted each week in the small original sanctuary, the need for a larger worship space had become pressing. In 1985 a new 300-seat sanctuary was built in a style compatible with the elegant simplicity of the original church, which now serves as a chapel and is known affectionately as "Little St. Anne's."

The Rt. Rev. Harry Woolston Shipps, eighth bishop of Georgia, consecrated the new sanctuary on October 12, 1985. A new parish hall followed in 1986. In 1994 the Chambers Memorial Organ, built by Casavant Frères of Canada, was installed in memory of Jerry Chambers.

Under the leadership of Fr. Hurst, the 1980s and 1990s proved to be a season of significant spiritual growth at St. Anne's. As a result of his abiding devotion to strong liturgical worship and his abilities as a spiritual teacher and historian, St. Anne's became a thriving center for healing, education, thoughtful spirituality, and worship steeped in the sacraments. After Fr. Hurst's ministry of twenty-three years, the Rev. Ronald Davidson was appointed interim rector in 2006.

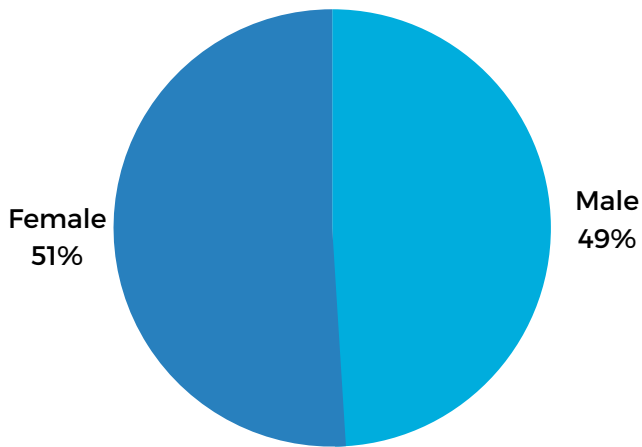
In 2009, the Rev. Thomas A. "Lonnie" Lacy II, was called. Building on the foundations laid by generations past, St. Anne's placed new emphases in the 2010s on strong lay leadership, biblical literacy, foreign mission, local outreach, and ministry with the young. In 2015 during a new season of growth, the church built a new ministry center, replacing the original education building and expanding the congregation's capacity for education, outreach, and ministry. The ministry center is dedicated to lifelong parishioner and architect Roy Rankin, a descendant of Captain Tift. Traditional liturgy combined with a broad approach to music, a strong theology of grace in the pulpit, and a joyful focus on celebrating the fullness of the Christian year all brought new meaning and strength to the life of the parish.

From St. Anne's humble beginnings as a tiny mission in the 1890s to our thriving life together today, we are deeply aware of God's presence and guidance throughout our history. With grateful hearts for all that has been, we offer the present to God's glory, and we look to the future with hope.

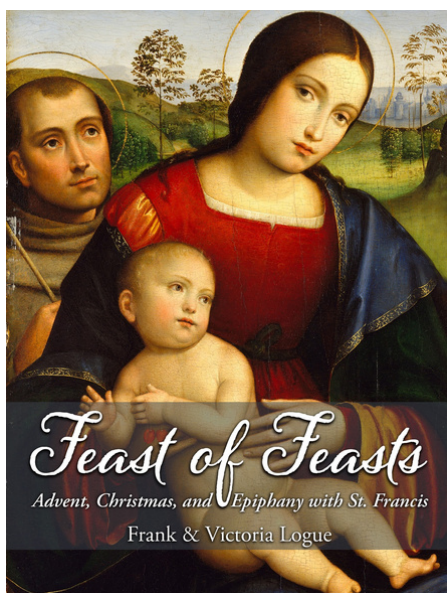
# THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF GEORGIA



Bishop Frank Logue

Among the settlers arriving with Georgia founder James Edward Oglethorpe in 1733 was a clergyman from the Church of England. The Diocese of Georgia was established in 1823 and by 1907 had grown so much that it was divided geographically and the Diocese of Atlanta was created.

Today, the Diocese of Georgia spans the southern portion of the state from the rolling farms and piney woodlands in the west to the marshes and coastlands in the east. We are home to 69 parishes diverse in size, theology, liturgical style, wealth and race. We also maintain several chapels throughout the Diocese. Thirty of our congregations are located within 20 miles of cities with populations of 40,000 or more, and the other 40 congregations are situated in suburbs, county seats, and rural towns.

Our current bishop, the Right Reverend Frank S. Logue, was ordained on May 30, 2020, becoming the 11th Bishop of the Diocese of Georgia. Approximately 150 clergy are canonically resident in the Diocese of Georgia at any given time. Included in the active clergy are more than 30 non-stipendiary vocational deacons, who serve in the Diocese under the guidance of the Bishop. Most of the clergy in the Diocese serve in parishes and missions; some serve as school, hospital, and hospice chaplains or in other non-parochial ministries expressing their special gifts.

Priests of the Diocese of Georgia are expected to participate in convocational clericus meetings (monthly through most of the year), clergy conferences, and the diocesan convention. Clergy are also called upon to serve on various diocesan boards, committees, and commissions as part of their service to the larger church.

# WORSHIP

Worship services at St. Anne's are typically celebrations of the Holy Eucharist, and is best described as "high church".

- Rite II, formally is observed
- The Gospel Book is processed and read amongst the congregation.
- Incense is used during Sunday service.
- Prayer Books and Hymnals are used regularly and are found conveniently in pews.
- Live-streaming services began during the pandemic and have continued.
- An MC, Lay Eucharist Ministers, acolytes, readers, greeters, and ushers assist during Sunday services.
- Bulletins are expanded on major feasts to include the entire service and readings for ease of the congregation, especially visitors
- An Annotated Eucharist is also offered occasionally for the benefit of visitors.

# WORSHIP



## CHOIR

Our music ministry is a prominent part of worship at St. Anne's. The choir rehearses weekly and sings for the 10 a.m Holy Eucharist. The choir also presents special musical selections on occasions such as Midnight Christmas Mass and The Great Vigil of Easter.



## ACOLYTES

St. Anne's has a very large, enthusiastic acolyte program. We believe every young person should have a Sunday ministry. Acolytes assist the clergy in serving the altar on Sundays. Children and youth in 2nd through 12th grades are eligible to acolyte. Training takes place regularly through the year.



## ALTAR GUILD

The altar guild is a volunteer team of the parish whose ministry is to care for the altar and altar linens. Altar Guild members also prepare the sanctuary for services and clean up afterwards.



## GREETERS AND USHERS

All members of St. Anne's are considered to be greeters. However, there is a group of members who volunteer to greet every Sunday on a scheduled rotation. We feel greeting visitors and newcomers is a Christian responsibility of welcoming everyone to St. Anne's. Ushers are ready to assist anyone needing assistance in seating or just simply finding their way in the church. The ushers at St. Anne's also counts the number of people in the congregation, collect and present the offerings at the offertory and assist the congregation during the administration of communion.

## MASTER OF CEREMONIES AND EUCHARISTIC MINISTERS

St. Anne's has MCs present in the liturgy to direct the movements of the various ministers and people involved and to coordinate a sustained ceremonial style throughout. Also present are eucharistic ministers who are licensed by the bishop to administer the consecrated elements of the Eucharist.





# OUTREACH

Christian people live in two different worlds: the world as it is, and the world as God calls it to be. For that reason, the “outreach” we do through St. Anne’s is about something far greater than civic volunteerism, personal altruism, or simple charity. Christian outreach is about recognizing that God is in the business of healing and reconciling this world, and we are called to be active participants in that healing. Can we fix everything that’s broken? No. But we can bear witness to God’s love in ways large and small. It begins in our own backyard.

## **Food Box**

This ministry provides a monthly box of non-perishable (and limited perishable) groceries to families requesting special assistance.

## **Emergency Food Bags**

Emergency Food Bags provide a bag of non-perishables that require little, if any cooking. Bags are packed and ready for those who come to the church office needing food assistance. Volunteers pack the bags that are stored in the St. Anne’s Outreach Pantry and are ready when needed.

## **Knots of Love**

Knots of Love is a ministry provided by a dedicated group of volunteers at St. Anne's. They provide knitted, crocheted, and other hand-made items to those who are experiencing illness or bereavement in our community and beyond. This group also makes the crocheted angels used as gift tags for the Angel Tree gift program.

## **Loaves of Love**

This ministry shows compassion by baking and delivering bread and cookies to individuals and other ministries in our community, including Ruth’s Cottage and Brother Charlie’s Rescue Mission.

Every Christmas, members of St. Anne's come together to provide wrapped Christmas gifts to 35 residents of the Rehabilitation Center of South Georgia.

As stewards of the earth, St. Anne's volunteers of all ages gather bimonthly to pick up trash on the road adjacent to the Georgia Museum of Agriculture.

## Hope for Kids Holiday Project

St. Anne's members provide Christmas gifts for disadvantaged and abused children.

## Lunch at ABAC

Many St. Anne's parishioners work or study at Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College (ABAC). The group gathers for friendly banter and, if desired, to discuss the upcoming Sunday's Scripture readings.

## All Hallows' Eve

The St. Anne's All Hallows' Eve celebration is a free community event. Festivities include a Trunk-or-Treat, hayride, carnival games, and free supper. This event has nearly over 500 attendees annually.

## Other Ministries

The Outreach Support Group has been involved in the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life events, Cancer Care, and the Tift Regional Hospital mask-sewing project.

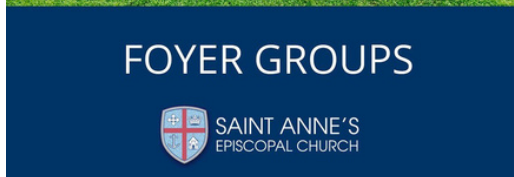
St. Anne's has a strong focus on community service and outreach, with programs such as the Food Ministry, Loaves of Love, Knots of Love, and a Youth Mission Trip that merge parishioners' pastoral care and community needs.

In addition to its regular programs and services, St. Anne's hosts special events and celebrations throughout the year. Some of these events include Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper, Holy Week Observances and Celebrations, Holy Ghost Weenie Roast (Pentecost Picnic), Vacation Bible School, Rally Sunday, All Hallows' Eve, Ice Cream Socials, and Christmas Observances and Celebrations. Another St. Anne's parish favorite event is the annual St. Anne's Got Talent Show where the parish comes together to raise funds for the mission ministry.
